MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING **March 15, 2010**

President Edie McKelvy called the meeting to order at 10:00 A.M. at the Silverdale Community Center. There were 64 members and guests present, plus six new members being acknowledged.

All those present joined Vice President Roberta Messinger in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States.

The election of new Trustees was carried out. New Trustees elected were Nick Tomassi, Barbara Maines, and Joy Smith. Arlene Runberg and Faye Henden, current Trustees, were reelected. Edie thanked the Nominating Committee, Pat Reese, Elise Haupt, Nancy Sanders, and Al Sanders, for their efforts.

Clinton Geiger, Program Chairman, introduced the speaker, David Nelson, Editor of The Kitsap Sun newspaper. David presented a talk on “Navigating Kitsapsun.com and Collaborating on Community Journalism”.

His first comment was to end the rumor that printed news would end and only Internet news would prevail. He said their present plans are to utilize both methods of news distribution. Today, their printed circulation is between 20,000 and 25,000; but there is a total of about 45,000 combined Internet and print customers.

The Kitsap Sun has about two and a half million stories read each month on both the Internet and print. The Sun runs their company with a total of one hundred employees, with twenty five in the newsroom.

David described features of the Kitsap Sun’s website. (www.kitsapsun.com) An interesting feature is a “share” link, where readers can submit announcements such as weddings, anniversaries, obituaries, social gathering or photos.

TIPS

Another Way to Print, Just a Little or a Whole Web Page

Internet Explorer doesn't have a setting that lets you to easily print multiple pages front to back. You can print pages one at a time or in a sequence.

Last month we outlined a procedure you could use to print just part of a web page or e-mail. This month we will present a method for you to use to print out as much or as little of a web page as you want.

You must have MS Word installed on your computer and you must use Internet Explorer 6+ as your Web browser.

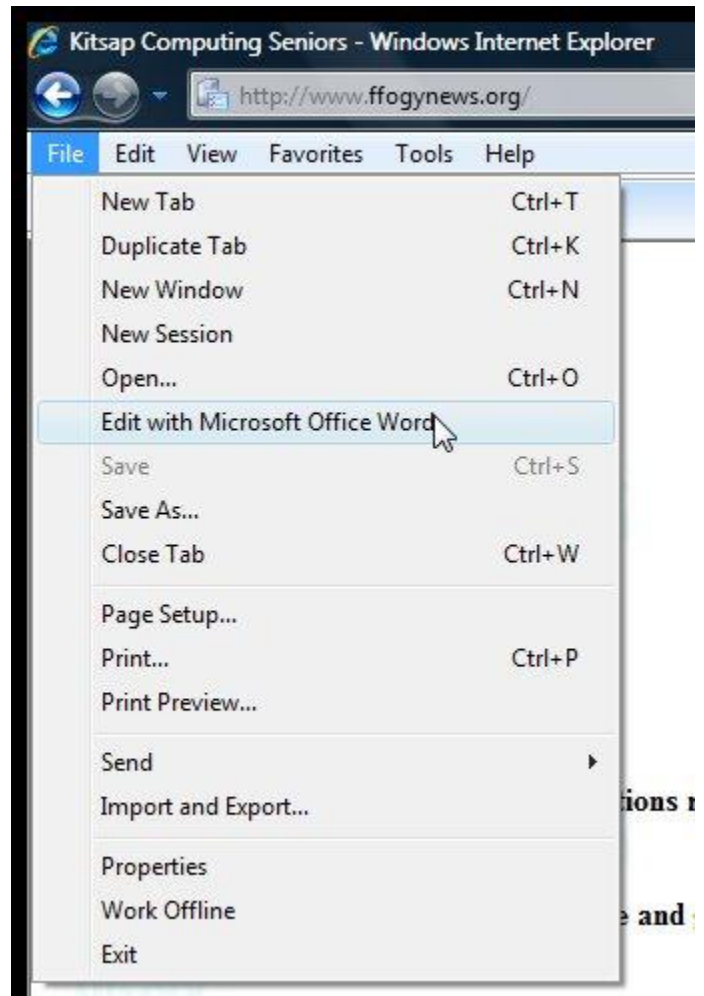
Here is how to do it.

- o Open the Web page you want to print.
- o Click **File > Edit** with Microsoft Office Word.

The page will open in Word. If things are not the way you want them, edit away – even change font size and/or color if you want. You can use most of Word's capabilities.

- o Click **File > Print** and choose the way you want the document to print.

Note: Not all web pages will open in Word!



Change Case of Text in Word Without Retyping

Do you find yourself continually pressing the Caps Lock key to change from uppercase to lowercase? Word does provide some toggle key combinations you can use to change the case of selected text without retyping.

One of the helpful key combinations is Shift + F3, which lets you toggle case from lowercase to uppercase and then to initial caps. For example, say you just typed *Tcp/Ip*. To change it to all uppercase, select it and then press Shift + F3. And to change the phrase "All's well that ends well" to initial caps, select the text and then press and hold the Shift key while you press F3 three times.
